On May 22-27 I shall have attended the National Garden Club convention in Seattle and look forward to bringing you messages and inspiration from that front.

As all of you are busy, busy, busy with your gardens that have gone from sleeping to leaping this spring be mindful of some of our goals. You all have dug and divided to the max and hopefully had successful spring plant sales or yard sales to yield the coins in order to support your local projects of community gardens, educational programming as well as support the "BIG FOUR" funds at the state level. Please take this year to resolve to up your club donation to scholarship, wetland conservancy through the land trust, blue star memorials, and habitat for humanity as a part of world gardening. Through these four funds, we collectively have tremendous impact as a group in our state. On the website you should be able to find the new (or returning) state chairmen to send funds to, or to direct your questions to on various topics.

If you missed the convention, I would love to share two exciting challenges forthcoming for The Garden Club of Indiana, Inc.: First we will soon be up and running on Facebook. The goal is June 1. The hope is that we can accomplish, together, a few things through this social media outlet. We certainly can get our word out there, maybe even post some fun pictures of what we are doing in our gardens and communities and answer questions from followers regarding those efforts. Secondly, we will reach a new audience that can then be introduced to garden clubbing. We are a wealth of information and camaraderie for the great pursuit of gardening in all its morphs. Additionally, it is my hope that we can encourage clubs around the state to post what is happening in their area so that if, perhaps, we are travelling around the state we can be aware of a garden tour, or sale or flower show and happen upon it. It is essential that we open ourselves publicly to invigorate our membership.

Additionally, the state board approved at their April meeting my state project which is TREES!!! \$4200 has been appropriated for at least 14 trees, distributed around the seven districts of our state for planting in public spaces. By the June board meeting, we will have the grant application distributed to the district directors who will then send on to the club presidents. Basically, the grant will ask that your club or district provide an actual or in kind donation of \$100 in order to secure The Garden Club of Indiana grant of up to \$300 for the installation of a tree in a public space or place. In turn, your district or club would arrange for this installation, and will acknowledge The Garden Club of Indiana during that public event. Tying this in to an Arbor Day celebration, a Blue Star dedication or the renewal of a park or downtown area which has been blighted are but bonuses to this end. Should we have great success in distributing these funds during this first year of my term, please know I will be only too happy to find, generate, or even beg for more money to have a greater impact during the second year. So put your heads together and get started on a plan for a tree! Now that we have the advantage of electronically distributing information among our members it is up to all of you to share your photos and your stories about what is going on in your area and communities. We all enjoy hearing about what you are doing and want to share in applauding your efforts.

Garden buddies: Don't forget your non-electronic pals who are in your club. Be sure to make a hard copy and share with them, so they may stay informed and connected with the rest of us. Penny Pines Program



TGCI Members and Member Clubs can partner with NGC and the National Forest Service and participate in the Penny Pines Program, a meaningful and practical Reforestation / Education Program that NGC and NFS partner. The Forest Service provides the labor to replant catastrophe damaged areas, which may be designated as to a particular state (Indiana, of course!!!), with indigenous trees, not just pines (which were originally planted when the program started in 1941), to provide for soil protection & conservation plus areas for recreation. Donations are a minimum of \$68, or multiples of (at its origin, donations were \$6.80 to plant an acre with 680 pines that cost a penny each, thus also explaining the program name). Please consider making a Penny Pines commitment and help to replant TREES in Indiana.









Why Plant Trees?

Trees.....

keep our air supply fresh by absorbing carbon dioxide and producing oxygen; provide shade and shelter;

can reduce heating and cooling costs when properly placed;

cut down noise pollution by acting as sound barriers;

stabilize the soil and prevent erosion with their roots;

improve water quality by slowing and filtering rain water as well as protecting aquifers and water sheds:

provide protection from downward fall of rain, sleet, hail as well as reduce storm run-off and flooding; can increase property value and enhance the quality of life;

located along streets act as a glare and reflection control;

can provide privacy and screening from unsightly views;

provide food and shelter for wildlife.
